

The program also helps businesses build lasting collections while showing their commitment and support for the region's artists.

Creating art is a dialogue that allows me to break the confines of spoken language and transform the elusive, intangible, and formless thoughts in my mind into concrete, physical objects in the visual world. My mixed media paintings and sculptures explore memories, dreams, transformation, and ultimately peace. They are a study of relationships to the self, others, and nature. Recently, I have come to realize my work is filled with gratitude toward an overwhelming outpouring of love and beauty that I had previously never recognized. The acknowledgment, acceptance, and celebration of that love has become an essential theme of my work.

Conceptually, my process relies heavily on the acts of deconstruction, reconstruction, and the layering of tiny pieces or brushstrokes to create a whole. I repetitively build up and remove layers of wood, fiber, and adhesives to create deep, visceral, and rugged textures. These textures create the emotive foundations that color expands upon.

Jones' artwork questions identity and beauty standards related to the experiences of African-American women and girls. When she creates, she aims to tell a story and give a visual on the complex narrative of what it's like to be a Black female in America.

Jones sees being an artist as a way of bringing attention to Black issues and topics, such as colorism and other underlying issues concerning beauty, gender bias, and racial oppression. It is through the creative process that she self-enlightens, and in sharing her work, lies the possibility and hope to help other African-American women and girls absolve themselves from their askew perceptions of what beauty looks like in America.

Though her art is mainly portraiture and figurative drawings and paintings, her work takes on social commentary, intergroup discrimination, and societal interpretations of beauty in the African-American community. As with any socially driven content-based art, she is mindful of the challenge of not caricaturing or stereotyping the moment, but rather capturing it in all its glory and its faults.

Artists

Urban landscapes, for me, are repositories of personal and collective memories. *Shifts in Urban Landscape* (2021–present), my latest series of paintings, references the serendipitous connections made during my walks around the neighborhood after moving to Lawrenceville from Singapore during the height of Covid in mid-2020.

In these works, I explore ways to render my perspective of space and form through geometric abstraction. The geometric shapes form an uncluttered and calm space in these tumultuous times.

By distilling cityscapes into abstract forms, I endeavor to subvert the traditional genre of landscape painting, thereby challenging the viewer's expectations of the work of art, and inviting new interpretations of the ordinary and the everyday.

Laura is a multidisciplinary artist, who works primarily in drawing, painting, ceramics, and photographic media. She received her BFA (2018) from the Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA) in Photography.

She explores the relationships between place, land, and nature of Pennsylvania and the personal connections she has formed there through images, paintings, and poetry. She's interested in the meaning of and relationship to an environment when time has passed and physical distance becomes a barrier. She seeks to define the significance of our emotional connections to a place and how these connections evolve and impact our present.

Laura dove further into painting Pittsburgh during quarantine when she would drive and photograph the quiet city, bringing her photographs to life through paintings and drawings. Excited by the constant exploration and hometown connection, the Pittsburgh series continues to grow. When not painting the Pittsburgh landscape, she shifts to objects found in nature, such as fruits and florals.

### Laura Stewart




I make paintings that recontextualize the everyday as jagged, half built, and fantastic.

He is originally from the Detroit area of Michigan and moved to Western Pennsylvania after college where he studied Mechanical Engineering.

Largely self-taught (thanks to the local public library and supportive parents), everything was learned through direct experimentation in either subjects and/or photographic techniques. This spirit of experimentation is still very evident in his work today with the frequent use of multi-exposures, long shutter speeds, and often, technically challenging subjects.

"Sometimes the experiment works, and the image is wonderful. Most of the time it does not. That's OK. It's frustrating, but that's part of the process of learning."


